The project will enable floodlighting to be installed at the club's pitch, increasing opportunities for training and football matches. Bluebell Railway PLC - £49,500

This project will fully restore a Victorian railway carriage to provide access and space for wheelchair users. Bluebell Railway operates steam trains along its heritage line in Sussex. Their set of Victorian carriages currently has no provision for wheelchair users. This project will make the set fully accessible to all. Once restored the carriage will be in service for many years giving pleasure both now and in the future to people with severe mobility problems, plus their friends and families.

In a normal year the Victorian set of coaches can be expected to make 250 journeys and thus this project this will provide 1,500 spaces for wheelchair users. By Christmas 2010 there will be capacity for 60+ wheelchairs users on the special Victorian Christmas trains. The space will be flexible such that fewer wheelchair users on a particular journey will permit more of their friends to be accommodated.

Success stories

Awards for All – September awards

Eastbourne

Parkland Junior School £10,000
Money was awarded to fund an out of hours activity programme.

The Friends of Old Town Library, Eastbourne £8,667
Money was given for the Friends of Old Town Library to set up an internet café.

The Bridgemere Centre £5,963
Money was awarded to build a new sewage pump at the centre.

Rother

Robertsbridge Community Association £8,105
Money was given to buy computer and sound equipment to update the village hall.

Rother District Citizens Advice Bureau £5,039
Money was given to provide clients with information via a self help kiosk and to buy laptops for the kiosk.

The Camber Memorial Hall £9,879
Money was given to buy exercise equipment and create a computer training room.

Wealden

Rotherfield Village Hall £9,842
Money was given to buy IT, music equipment, games consol and audio visual equipment to be able to put on a different range of activities for the youth of the village.

Community Cashback

Community Cashback is a new scheme which gives local people a say in how £4million of recovered criminal assets (for example confiscated cash or property) should be spent in their communities.

Here are 3 projects that are currently being funded by Community Cashback:

Bushey Wood Scout camp £11,650
Bushey Wood has been owned and managed by Eastbourne scout group since 1959. Bushey is also used by other youth and church groups, local schools and for adults with special needs increasing the users to over 3,000 per year. Scouting is the oldest and largest youth club in the country with strong leadership providing activities to steer youngsters away from being a nuisance and causing antisocial behaviour in the community. Bushy needs to increase its activities to continue to attract the interest of youths. The grant will be spent on a 12m traverse wall, with climbing surfaces on both sides including suitable safety flooring.

Piddinghoe Skate Park £13,568
The Local young people in Peacehaven have started to apply for funding to restore the local skate park which was destroyed by someone getting inside the ramps and setting fire to it all. Reinstating the park will give a large number of young people a

place to go and have fun with their friends, keeping them occupied and out of trouble. It will also ensure that the young people skate in an appropriate place, ensuring a higher level of safety on the streets of Peacehaven. This will address some of the antisocial behaviour in the area and enable the young people who have been trying hard to reinstate the park a sense of ownership and inclusion in the community.

The BEAT Youth Sports Club

£31,657

The BEAT and surrounding community plan to provide the following facilities:

- A garden and hard pathway for disabled people
- A garden where young people can learn horticultural skills
- A hard path around the perimeter of the land for the elderly to use
- Improved facilities, including sports pitches, where young people can go safe from alcohol abuse and drug taking

The BEAT aims to bring cohesion to the community by providing a safe and well maintained facility where community members of all ages can gather and grow, forming the seeds of regeneration to this sadly decaying community.

Interreg IVA

Channel Circus Arts Alliance, East Sussex

€ 91, 196

This project aims at developing, producing and touring circus new works on each side of the Channel, while founding a durable network which could increase possibilities for new circus works to be presented.

Developing innovative knowledge, competences and services in Health and Food Service Management across the Channel Region, East Sussex

€ 2, 978, 262

This project will provide new competencies to cope with the current situation of modern food production and food service activities, through three axes: - Research Project: "Novel Health & Food Service Technologies for Disadvantaged" - Curriculum Development: MSc and Mastère spécialisé CGE in Health & Food Service Management - Business Engagement: Health & Food Business Services

Eco Fab, Hastings

€217, 839.81

This pilot project aims to set up a Trans-Channel think tank to create theme-based networks of participants which will propose methods of prospecting for projects and schemes involved in eco-renovation and eco-building. The aim will be to identify the networks as regards: - resources and materials, - training and qualifications, - professional techniques and job descriptions, - policies being developed for accompanying contractors, - urban and rural revitalisation in the framework of sustainable development.

Magic Moments in Normandy and South East England, East Sussex

€ 1, 756, 203

The project aims at using festivals and events to maximise the visitor economy in Normandy and in the South East of England which share a diverse but under exploited assortment of high quality and distinct traditions, festivals and celebrations, making both regions desirable destinations for visitors. It will provide a strategic, co-ordinated approach to developing and marketing events, taking some of the best ones, improving them and adding additional activities, in order to provide knowledge, skills and opportunity for both regions.

Sustainable, Environmental Treatment & Reuse of Marine Sediments, East Sussex €5,093,895

The project partners will work jointly for the economic development of Channel Sea ports by finding modern economic and environmental solutions, based on robust scientific work.

Hardship Fund

St Peter and St James Hospice in Chailey have been awarded a grant for £188,914 to help with their palliative care to people with life-limiting illnesses and their families and to ensure that end-of-life care at patient's homes will be able to continue.

Young People's Fund 2

Youth Healthy Lifestyle Trainers £485,313
This new project will establish a healthy lifestyle programme for young people in East Sussex with the aim of reducing obesity and alcohol misuse and helping young people buy and cook healthy foods themselves.

Lottery

Arts Council - Grants for the arts

Arts Council England announced changes to its Grants for the arts programme that will transform the way it serves artists and save on administration costs, which will be reinvested in the arts.

The changes will come into effect from March 2010 when a central Grants for the arts team will assess and monitor all applications. For the first time artists and arts organisations will be able to apply to Grants for the arts online. This is a major step forward in making the programme more widely accessible and applications as easy as possible. The online process will be simple and user-friendly with drop down guidance to help applicants.

The first applications can be submitted online from 1 March 2010.

The Arts Council is also simplifying the information required for applications of £10,000 or less. Applicants will be asked for a shorter proposal which will allow a quicker decision, within six weeks.

To ensure that the transition from one way of working to the other is as efficient and seamless as possible Grants for the arts will be suspending new applications between Monday 18 January and Friday 26 February.

Arts Council's new website

Arts Council England have recently launched their new website. The new design follows several months of research and consultation with artists, arts professionals and the public, as well as a number of the Arts Council's funded organisations, to find out what they wanted most from the site.

The site is designed to be entertaining and easy to use, whether visitors want to experience art online, discover what's going on in the arts in their area or find out whether they're eligible for funding.

New features on the website include:

- A pioneering interactive map and smart search engine – to help users search everything from arts listings to funded organisations or regional offices, by entering their location or postcode
- Profiles of Arts Council funded organisations and their work, which will feature streamed audio and video content
- Access to the Arts Council Collection, including an online guide to recent acquisitions
- A unique 'Eligibility wizard', enabling potential Grants for the arts applicants to find out whether they are eligible for funding
- Digital art commissions will also form part of the new site, starting with a new digital artwork from Thomson & Craighead created exclusively for the launch.

The launch of the website represents the first phase of the Arts Council's redevelopment of its digital presence and primarily targets artists, arts professionals and the arts-engaged public. Future phases will aim to connect with low to medium engaged members of the public offering a route into high quality, interactive arts content and information.

Arts Council- Sustain

Arts Council England has closed its Sustain scheme to new applications. The programme was set up in response to the impact of the recession on arts organisations, offering one-off awards of between £75,000-£3m to help organisations maintain their artistic, financial and organisational viability during the recession.

Arts Council -Unlimited

Unlimited will celebrate disability, arts, culture and sport on an unprecedented scale, as part of the London 2012 Cultural Olympiad. The programme has four pillars:

- Unlimited Commissions: a £1.5million commission fund to support the production of quality work by disabled and deaf artists, and disabled and deaf led arts organisations
- Unlimited Talent: bespoke training and mentoring programme for successful applicants to support the realisation of their commission
- Unlimited Presents: work created through Unlimited Commissions will have the opportunity to be showcased in London and across the UK
- Unlimited International: supporting collaboration between artists in the UK and other countries, and showcasing new work around the world. This pillar of the programme is being led by the British Council and is still in development, full details will be announced in 2010

The Arts Council welcome proposals from disabled and deaf artists, and disabled and deaf-led arts organisations, who wish to develop their work, strengthen their artistic practice, challenge perceptions and forge new partnerships with presenting venues and events. Applications must meet the standard assessment criteria for Grants for the arts applications. There are three deadlines for the commissions: 4 January 2010, 1 October 2010 & 18 April 2011. Heritage Lottery Fund - Townscape Heritage Initiative

Through their Townscape Heritage Initiative (THI) programme, the Heritage Lottery Fund make grants that help communities to regenerate conservation areas displaying particular social and economic need throughout the United Kingdom. It encourages partnerships to carry out repairs and other works to a number of historic properties

within those areas, and improve the quality of life for all those who live, work or visit there.

The national batch deadline for first-round applications is 30 November each year and decisions are made in April.

They expect schemes to deliver the following outcomes:

- Preserving and enhancing the character and appearance of conservation areas affected by high levels of deprivation and in need of regeneration.
- Bringing historic buildings back into appropriate and sustainable use.
- Safeguarding the character of conservation areas through:
 - increasing training opportunities in heritage skills;
 - increasing community participation; and
 - improving approaches to conservation management and maintenance.

If you believe that your project meets the criteria for this grant, you will first need to submit a pre-application enquiry form online. They strongly recommend that you read the application introduction and help notes before sending in a pre-application enquiry.

Outcomes Star

Funded by the Big Lottery, the Outcome Star™ is a free tool for the voluntary and statutory sector to use. The Outcomes Star™ measures progress for service users receiving support in order to maximise independence or achieve other goals. There are different versions of the Star for different sectors (e.g. homelessness, substance misuse, mental health and young people). All versions consist of a number of scales and a Star chart onto which the service user's score on each scale is plotted.

The Outcomes Star™ has proved enormously popular with workers, managers, service users and commissioners because:

- It helps improve keywork and provides evidence of outcomes
- It counts the things that really count
- It is easy to implement.

Reaching Communities

In response to the recession, The Big Lottery Fund (BIG) has announced they have relaxed the eligibility criteria for their Reaching Communities programme.

Projects can now be considered in the following areas:

- Advice - Advice on rights and responsibilities, as well as those that offering counselling

- Family Learning - Family learning activities, shared learning between adults and children in the family and projects that offer general family support, e.g. parenting skills.
- Wellbeing - Health, well-being or physical activity projects
- Young People – That have young people as their primary beneficiaries
- Children's Play - Activities that include play such as after school clubs or one o' clock clubs, and small-scale refurbishments, maximum capital grant £50,000, maximum total capital expenditure £200,000
- Community Buildings - Small-scale refurbishments, maximum capital grant £50,000, maximum total capital expenditure is £200,000
- Community Libraries - Services taking place within libraries
- Parks - Smaller projects within a park e.g. a park warden or a refurbished football pitch. Small-scale refurbishments, maximum capital grant £50,000, maximum total capital expenditure is £200,000

Sportsmatch

Sportsmatch is a programme that increases investment in community sport by matching sponsorship money pound for pound. It also helps increase participation in sports at community level by making awards to organisations that are running sporting programmes.

Government

Future Jobs Fund

Funding to create 2,000 new jobs for young people in sport has been announced by the Government as part of its £1 billion Future Jobs Fund.

SkillsActive, one of Sport England's national partners, will help to shape the qualifications, training and continuous professional development the young employees need. The National Skills Academy for Sport and Active Leisure, part of the SkillsActive Group, will deliver the Future Jobs Fund programme in partnership with the Youth Sport Trust, a number of NGBs, the Prince's Trust and the Dame Kelly Holmes Legacy Trust.

Together they will create and support new jobs in sport, giving young people the opportunity to develop careers in coaching, leadership and sports development. Sport England is currently working with county sports partnerships and several other NGBs to examine the potential to create further opportunities through the fund.

The Future Jobs Fund will provide funding for 150,000 posts - at least 100,000 for young people and 50,000 in unemployment hotspots. Young people can apply for jobs through the fund if they have been unemployed for 10 months or more.

Hastings Borough Council will be able to create 354 jobs across the county after receiving £2.3million from the Future Jobs Fund.

Green Bus Fund

The main purpose of the Green Bus Fund is to support and hasten the introduction of hundreds of low carbon buses across England.

In total, the Fund will be worth £30 million.

Individual applicants will receive a maximum of £5 million from the Fund. Where joint bids are received, each bidder will be treated separately for the purpose of the £5 million cap (so a joint bid could be submitted for more than £5 million). However, bus companies should bear in mind that the £5 million maximum applies collectively across all their subsidiary companies.

Funding can be used towards:

- the additional up-front cost of buying low carbon buses;
- stimulating the development of a new green technology industry;
- helping to safeguard up to 900 jobs in bus manufacturing; and
- turning an existing order for standard buses into an order for low carbon buses.

The Fund is also available for very low and zero emission vehicles, such as electric vehicles.

Bus companies, local authorities in England, Passenger Transport Executives (PTEs), Transport for London (TfL) and companies leasing/renting buses to these

bodies are eligible to apply to the Fund. All bids will be assessed together and no category of bidder will receive priority over another.

Help the Hospices - Department of Health Capital Grant Programme

As part of the funding made available to support implementation of the End of Life Care Strategy, the Department of Health has identified £40 million in 2010/11 to fund improvements to the physical environment for adult voluntary sector hospices.

Examples of eligible projects could include the following:

- Refurbishment of dining rooms, day areas, reception areas or other common spaces.
- Refurbishment of bedrooms, including provision of specialist pressure-relieving mattresses or beds, ceiling-mounted hoists or single sex accommodation.
- Improvements to gardens to enable patients, and their families and carers to spend time outdoors.
- Improvements to visitor facilities, including bereavement and overnight suites, counselling rooms, and play areas for children.

The total amount of available funding is £40 million. The minimum grant will be £25,000 - there is no upper grant limit, but Help the Hospices does not expect to award grants of more than £600,000 (and then only in exceptional cases). As the aim of the programme is to benefit the greatest possible number of people, large grants are likely to be few in number.

Wealden Community Grants Scheme

The Youth Leadership Fund

The Youth Leadership Fund is part of the Youth of Today programme, a major youth leadership programme for young people aged 13-19 that aims to increase the quality and diversity of opportunities for young people as leaders of change in their communities. The initiative is focused on targeting young people who are disadvantaged.

Grant applications are sought from voluntary and third sector organisations that meet the following aims:

- Support and build the capacity of the voluntary and community sector, enabling organisations to impact on delivery and support of high quality youth leadership opportunities to disadvantaged young people/marginalised groups across England, focusing particularly on young people who have not had the opportunity to lead before.
- Support organisations or partnerships to work collaboratively to create leadership pathways.
- Contribute to the building of a lasting, sustainable infrastructure for youth leadership beyond March 2011.
- Work across a wide geographical area.
