Success stories

Awards for All

Eastbourne

The Chaseley Trust £1,355
This charitable company will put their award towards hosting a weekend of workshops and taster sessions.

Friends of Queen Alexandra Cottage Homes £4,865
This charity which provides care homes for older people will use the award to improve inclusive recreational facilities.

Eastbourne Citizens Advice Bureau £10,000
This organisation will use the funding to purchase additional IT equipment to enable them to improve the capacity and record keeping of the organisation. The equipment will enable the group to take on and provide training for volunteers.

Ocklynge School Parent Teacher Association £10,000
This school will use the award to purchase a bank of laptops to be used by disadvantaged children who attend Ocklynge Junior School.

Hastings

Hastings and Rother Counselling Service £9,992
This registered charity will use the award to upgrade their IT systems to allow for a comprehensive booking system, a client progress tracking system and databases for statistics on service users.

Oasis Community Project - East Hastings £8,185
This new group will provide activities for older members of the community, particularly aimed at BME groups without English as their first language. Activities will include a craft group, badminton and multi cultural healthy eating sessions.

Lewes

Telscombe Cliffs C P School £9,600
This school will use the award to equip and furnish a log cabin that will be used as part of their extended schools project. The fully equipped cabin will enable the school to host activities that promote community links such as parent and toddler groups.

Wealden

Forest Row Parish Council £10,000
Forest Row Parish Council will use the award to refurbish an old mobile classroom block. The classroom will be used to run a youth group, a 'drop in' cafe and to provide social facility for young people to access. This will create a safe and warm facility.

Sussex Archaeological Society £49,700

Lewes Priory Trust

£545,500

The 11th Century Lewes Priory has been awarded £545,500 from the Heritage Lottery Fund (HLF).

The Grade I listed Norman property in Cockshut Road is described by HLF as "one of the most important historical buildings in south-east England".

The grant covers 75% of the cost of the two-year project to conserve the ruins and make them safe for visitors.

Modernisation Fund

The first phase of the programme offered grants of £1,000 to frontline organisations working in areas of importance to communities affected by the economic downturn. The grants were for organisations to access advice and support, focusing in particular on the benefits that organisations may gain from collaboration or merger.

Natural England

Sussex Wildlife Trust

Sussex Wildlife Trust, the county's leading conservation charity, and project partners Hastings Borough Council and Brighton & Hove City Council, have been awarded a grant of £274,697 by Natural England's Access to Nature, which is funded from the Big Lottery Fund's Changing Spaces programme.

This grant funds a three year project giving people a greater chance to experience and enjoy the natural world on their doorstep.

The long term aim is to give people from urban areas the opportunity to take an active role in the management of local green spaces while gaining new skills and confidence. Each area will have a group of community representatives to help drive the project forward during its initial three years and hopefully beyond.

Call of the Wild project

The Sussex-based Call of the Wild project offers new and innovative environmental programmes for young people. It will benefit disadvantaged groups such as those not in education, employment or training. Tailored programmes, from youth training programmes to woodland activities, will create opportunities for new groups to get more involved with the natural world, leading to formal accreditation.

Government

Apprenticeship Awards

The aim of these awards is to recognise the achievements of employers who use apprenticeships to improve business performance, as well as rewarding apprentices who are exceeding their employer's and learning provider's expectations.

The 2010 awards comprise the following categories:

- Apprentice Awards
- Young Apprentice Award
- Employer Awards

Winners in the Apprentice Awards category will receive up to £1,000 worth of prizes. The winner of the Young Apprentice Award will receive up to £500 worth of prizes. The winner of the Employer Awards will obtain the business kudos associated with an important national award, as well as national publicity.

Bio-energy Capital Grants Scheme

The purpose of the Bio-energy Capital Grants Scheme is to promote the efficient use of biomass for energy by stimulating the deployment of biomass fuelled heat, and biomass combined heat and power, projects. All projects must be physically installed in England and supply energy to beneficiaries in the UK.

Businesses, organisations and charities in the commercial, industrial and community sectors are eligible to apply. This includes, but is not restricted to, public and private limited companies, sole traders, farmers, schools, colleges, universities, hospitals, local authorities, housing associations and charities.

The Scheme is scheduled to end on 31 March 2011 and all projects must have spent their grant by that date. The Department of Energy and Climate Change (DECC) will give priority to projects that can complete by September 2010. Projects that plan to complete between September 2010 and March 2011 will still be considered for funding if they can guarantee that they will incur all grant-related costs no later than 31 March 2011.

It is anticipated that this will be the final Round of the Bio-Energy Capital Grants Scheme in England.

The total funding available for this round is approximately £4 million and the Project Board will meet to make funding decisions on a monthly basis from January 2010. The Scheme will run until 31 March 2010, or until all funds have been allocated.

A further round of this scheme has been announced. £4m will be available under Round 6, with grants of up to £500,000 available for business and community organisations, such as schools and hospitals, to help towards the cost of buying and installing biomass-fuelled heating and combined heat and power projects.

YouthBank

If you live in East Sussex and your children have got a great idea to improve youth services in the county, they could bid for the latest round of funding available through the East Sussex YouthBank.

The YouthBank gives young people the chance to apply for funding ranging from £500 to £5,000 and put it towards youth projects and services which will improve things to do and places they go in their community.

Young people are involved at every stage - they put forward their ideas and bid for funding, a panel of young people decides which projects should get the cash and then the young people themselves enjoy the projects.

The £173,000 funding comes from our Cabinet. £20,000 has also been provided by the Aiming High Short Breaks for Disabled Children initiative. Aiming High is a government scheme which allocates money to local authorities to improve services for disabled young people.

Youth Sector Development Fund

The purpose of this Fund is to support third sector organisations that deliver effective services and activities for young people, particularly the most disadvantaged. The Fund will help organisations to grow their capacity, support them to compete for local contracts and become fully sustainable.

The fourth round of the Fund focuses on supporting the aims of the Government's Information, Advice and Guidance (IAG) Strategy: Quality, Choice and Aspiration: A Strategy for Young People's Information, Advice and Guidance.

Approximately 25 organisations, which require funding and support to diversify their income streams to enable long-term financial sustainability, will be supported through the Fund.

Between £200,000 and £500,000 is available per organisation from April 2010 to March 2011. This figure must represent no more than 40% of the organisation's annual turnover.

Applications are welcome from formally constituted third sector organisations that provide services to disadvantaged young people. Funding will only be provided to third sector organisations with an annual turnover of at least 2.5 times the sum bid for.

Lottery

Arts Council

Arts Council England will suspend applications to its Grants for the arts programme for a period of six weeks between Monday 18 January and Friday 26 February. This means that applications need to be submitted by 5pm on Friday 15 January to ensure decisions are made before the end of March.

The temporary suspension will allow the effective introduction of the new, improved application process from 1 March 2010. For the first time artists and arts organisations will be able to apply to Grants for the arts online making the programme more widely accessible and the application process as easy as possible.

A new national 'Grants for the arts' team, based in the Arts Council's assessment centre in Manchester, will assess and monitor all applications. The new teams will be focused around individual artforms and will maintain close links to each region, with decisions continuing to be made within the region. This will allow the Arts Council to make funding decisions using a national framework and ensures consistent advice and assessment is given to applicants wherever they are based.

Big Lottery – Young People

Five-year grants are being made available for projects that support young carers, people leaving care and young offenders. There will be £30 million available next year for projects that support young people.

The new funding will be given to charities and public sector bodies that assist young carers, young people leaving care and young offender institutions. At least 80 per cent of the funding will be allocated to charities and community groups.

A panel of young people will help to decide which projects will receive funds under the scheme. Funding applications that young people had directly contributed to would be looked upon favourably.

Sportsmatch England

Sport England's Sportsmatch programme makes awards to not-for-profit organisations running projects at a community level which meet one or both of Sport England's objectives of Grow or Sustain.

Pound for pound matched funding of the sponsors' money is available for amounts ranging from £1,000 (£500 for schools) to £100,000. Projects must be delivered within a 12 month period, but spend and account for Sport England's contribution by 31 March 2011.

Eligible sponsors include companies, private individuals and charities/charitable trusts providing a minimum of £1,000 (£500 for schools).

Trusts and Foundations

ACRE - COMMA Fund for Community Projects

Communities can apply through their local Rural Community Action Network (RCAN) for grants of between £3,000 and £20,000 to support community projects and amenities. Action with Communities in Rural England (ACRE) and RCAN are delivering the grants on behalf of DEFRA, funded by the aggregates levy on quarries.

The Fund is open to parish councils, registered charities and community organisations with a formal constitution. Almost any community activity can be supported.

The following five conditions apply for a project to be eligible for funding:

- The community where the project is based is/has been affected by aggregates extraction or transportation of aggregates.
- The proposed project is within 10 kilometres of an aggregates extraction site, either current or disused.
- The proposed project must benefit the whole community or a section of the community, not an individual.
- The applicant must be a community organisation, a charity or a parish council.
- All project works funded by COMMA grants in 2010/11 must be capable of completion by the end of March 2011.

Applications must be made to one of the 23 RCAN members in whose areas the fund is applicable.

Application forms and guidelines will be available from the ACRE website from 1 March 2010 and the deadline for applications is 14 May 2010. See www.acre.org.uk/sustainabledevelopment_comma.html to find out if you are eligible for funding.

Anchor Foundation

This fund provides grants of between £500-£10,000 per year to Christian charities that encourage social inclusion through ministries of healing and the arts. Funding can be awarded for up to three years. The Foundation will consider applications for either capital or revenue funding. Only in exceptional circumstances will grants be given for building work. Previously-funded projects include:

ASDA Foundation

The Foundation supports projects that will make a difference to the communities in which ASDA has a presence and its colleagues can get involved in. ASDA colleagues will support many local charities, local community groups, schools, playgroups, community centres and football teams. No minimum or maximum grant amount stipulated.

The ASDA Foundation only support a limited number of requests that have the direct support and involvement from ASDA employees. Baring Foundation

Registered charities, voluntary groups and not-for-profit organisations that work with non-governmental organisations and community-based organisations in sub-Saharan Africa can apply.

The maximum size of grant is £250,000 and it can be awarded for a duration of up to five years. Grants are available to help tackle the problem arising from long-term migration and displacement of people in sub-Saharan Africa. Applicants are expected to channel grant funding into organisations operating in the region.

The Foundation will support activities including the following:

- Developing networks and other partnerships.
- Training programmes.
- Research and dialogues with policy and decision-makers about issues affecting NGOs and communities.
- Workshops, meetings and exchange visits.
- Piloting new approaches.
- Improving information resources.
- Improving financial and administrative systems.

Barrow Cadbury Trust

The Trust promotes social justice through grant making, research, influencing public opinion and policy and supporting local communities through three key programmes of work:

- Criminal Justice.
- Migration.
- Poverty and Inclusion.

Grants are awarded in three categories:

- Small grants of up to £3,000.
- Minor grants of up to £10,000.
- Major grants of over £10,000.

Proposals are welcomed from charitable organisations in the UK. Applicants are not required to be a registered charity or incorporated charitable company, but are expected to have a formal structure, governing documents and a bank account in their own name.

B&Q Waste Donation Scheme

B&Q operates this Scheme through all of its stores within the UK. B&Q donates products and waste materials they haven't been able to sell for re-use such as slightly damaged tins of paint, off-cuts of timber, odd rolls of wallpaper and end-of-range materials. Donated products should benefit the local community and the environment. Under no circumstances can groups resell any donated waste.

Applications must be made directly to B&Q stores. The waste donation scheme is co-ordinated in store either by the environmental champion, duty or Warehouse manager who will keep a Waste Donation Form on file for interested groups. Beatrice Laing Trust

This charitable trust provides mainly small grants for the relief of poverty in its broadest sense and the advancement of the evangelical Christian faith. There are three types of grants:

- Small grants - Towards the core costs of national charities;
- Small capital grants – For local organisations working to relieve poverty in their local community
- Larger Grants – These are for one-off or recurring (up to three years) grants for capital work or towards specific projects.

Applicants must be registered charities, mostly those working with children, young people and the elderly, with the homeless, and those with physical, mental or learning difficulties. Most grants are between £1,000-£5,000.

Grants of up to £30,000 are available but tend to be awarded to larger national organisations. This trust is one of the Laing Family Trusts, three separate charitable trusts (others are Kirby Laing Foundation and the Maurice and Hilda Laing Charitable Trust) who all share staff and office space. An application to one Laing Family Trust is considered an application to all. C Charitable Trust

This Trust aims to support third sector organisations undertaking projects for a wide range of charitable purposes including:

- Assisting people attempting to improve their lives
- Disability or people no longer able to help themselves
- Buildings or works of heritage value
- Animal welfare
- The environment
- Small or minority charities.

Funding is not available for political purposes; projects with a commercial bias for a product or company; religious bias and individuals.

Applications may be submitted at any time. Electronic applications are preferred, and should contain as much project information relating to the application as possible and full accounts for the most recent completed financial year. Carbon Trust Applied Research Grants

The current call for the Carbon Trust's Applied Research programme is now open. Applied Research Grant funding is available to any business, university, public sector or voluntary organisation and aims to support the development and commercialisation of technologies which have the potential to reduce UK carbon emissions.

Grants of up to £500,000 are available. A minimum of 40% match funding is required subject to State Aid legislation. Cash or "in-kind" contributions are acceptable; however in-kind contributions have to be 'fair and reasonable'.

Projects must demonstrate the following:

- Genuine innovation and the potential to contribute to substantial reductions in UK greenhouse gas emissions.
- That the work is well planned and builds on previous work in the area.
- That the results of the work will allow a clear step forward on the path towards commercialisation.
- That it represents good value for money and provides demonstrative benefit to the UK.

Dulverton Trust

The Dulverton Trust awards grant funding to charitable organisations in the UK working in the following areas:

- Youth and Education
- General Welfare
- Conservation
- Preservation
- Peace and Humanitarian Support
- Africa

The Trust offers two types of grant:

- Major Grants with no fixed limit are available to charities with an annual income below £50 million and that operate nationally or across the geographical regions of the UK.
- Minor Grants up to a maximum of £3,500 are available to smaller charities with an annual income below £400,000 that are usually working at a local or county level.

Applications are welcomed from registered charities or organisations with officially recognised charitable status in the UK.

EDF Energy Trust - Small Grants Programme

This scheme offers grants of up to a maximum of £3,000 to voluntary and not-for-profit organisations that provide money advice services in areas where many customers are supplied by EDF Energy. The funding is available for small capital items or activities that will assist in the provision of 'energy debt' advice and submission of online applications to the EDF Energy Trust's programme for individuals.

Examples of items that the Trust may consider include: computers or laptops; printers; software; self help materials on debt prevention or resolution for clients; money advice training course fees; and development of energy debt prevention literature in community languages. More than one item can be applied for as long as the total value of all items does not exceed £3,000.

E.ON Sustainable Energy Fund

The E.ON Sustainable Energy Fund, which supports community energy projects, has announced new deadlines for 2010.

Community groups, charities and not-for-profit organisations that benefit education groups, vulnerable people or people in fuel poverty can apply for grants of up to £20,000, for up to 90% of costs, to implement sustainable energy projects in community buildings. Joint proposals, for example with local authorities, will be considered although the community organisation must lead the application.

To be eligible, projects must:

- result in the creation of renewable energy and/or a reduction in the amount of energy used
- have a positive impact on the local community
- have a measurable positive impact on the local environment which will most likely be demonstrated through carbon savings
- be used for purchase and implementation of capital equipment, physical measures and associated costs
- involve and/or have consent of the local community
- be sustainable beyond the support of the Fund and
- be completed within 12 months of a grant being awarded.

Faiths in Action

Faiths in Action is a £4 million grant programme, distributed over two years in two rounds of funding. In the first round, 216 organisations were offered grants of up to £12,000, totalling over £2.43 million. The grant is for local projects and activities, and is open to faith, inter faith, voluntary and community sector organisations at national, regional and local levels in England.

There is no formal deadline for applications – Round 2 is a rolling programme.

Applications will be accepted in the date and time order that they are received until the total value of the eligible, relevant applications received equals the overall value of the fund.

Friends Provident Foundation

Friends Provident Foundation is a grant-making charity, run by Trustees and independent of Friends Provident Group plc. It currently works to create the conditions throughout the UK for improved access to appropriate financial services for those who are currently excluded, particularly those on low incomes or otherwise vulnerable to market failure.

They aim to:

- encourage thinking that deals with the cause of the problem;

Fuserna Foundation

The Foundation's objectives are as follows:

European Local Energy Assistance (ELENA) Initiative

The European Commission, in conjunction with the European Investment Bank, has launched a new €15 million grant aid initiative called ELENA (European Local Energy Assistance). This initiative will help local and regional authorities attract outside finance towards new investments in energy efficiency and renewable energy.

Grant support is provided within the framework of the Intelligent Energy Europe (IEE II) programme and aims to support regional or local authorities in accelerating their investment programmes in the fields of energy efficiency and renewable energy sources, and in contributing to the “20-20-20” initiative of the EU.

ELENA support can be provided for the development of investment programmes or projects within the following areas:

- Public and private buildings, including social housing and street and traffic lighting, to support increased energy efficiency, e.g. refurbishment of buildings aimed at significantly decreasing energy consumption (both heat and electricity), such as thermal insulation, efficient air conditioning and ventilation, efficient lighting.
- Integration of renewable energy sources (RES) into the built environment, e.g. solar photovoltaic (PV), solar thermal collectors and biomass.
- Investments into renovating, extending or building new district heating/cooling networks, including networks based on combined heat and power (CHP); decentralised CHP systems (building or neighbourhood level).
- Urban transport to support increased energy efficiency and integration of renewable energy sources, e.g. high energy efficiency buses, including hybrid buses, electrical or low-carbon propulsion systems, investments to facilitate the introduction of electric cars, investments to introduce new, more energy efficient concepts to improve freight logistics in urban areas.
- Local infrastructure, including smart grids, information and communication technology infrastructure for energy efficiency, energy-efficient urban equipment, inter-modal transport facilities and refuelling infrastructure for alternative fuel vehicles.

Grants are available for up to 90% of eligible costs required for technical support related to a clearly identified investment programme. Eligible costs are any technical support that is necessary to prepare, implement and finance the investment

programme. This technical support may be of different types, for example: feasibility and market studies, structuring of programmes, business plans, energy audits, preparation of tendering procedures and contractual arrangements and project implementation units.

No minimum or maximum grant sizes are stipulated; however, the objective of ELENA is to increase experience in developing investment programmes of a certain size, normally above €50 million. Small projects can be supported when they are integrated into larger investment programmes. Regrouping of small projects into larger programmes allows transaction costs to be reduced and improves the “bankability” of the individual projects, which is one of the ELENA selection criteria.
