Training

Clare Leadership Programme - 2010/11

Approximately 20 Fellowships are being offered for the 2010/11 Programme to help train and develop a new generation of leaders for the cultural sector in the UK.

Fellowships are offered over a wide range of cultural activity, including the arts, visual arts, community arts, museums and galleries, heritage and libraries. Applications are welcomed from any individual involved in, or seeking to become involved in, the cultural sector in the UK. Applicants should normally have had a total of at least five years' work experience, either in employment, self-employment or freelance and be living in the EU.

Fellows undertake an individually tailored programme of activities. This programme usually lasts for a year and includes the following:

- A programme of professional development, including two residential leadership courses, intensive workshops and other learning opportunities.
- Mentoring and coaching.
- A three-month placement in an organisation very different from the Fellow's usual working environment.
- Working with a small group of Fellows on a special project, culminating in a half-day presentation.
- The production of an original article about an aspect of leadership which the Fellow has researched and which will be published to stimulate debate about leadership.
- The option of submitting a proposal for a three-month research project, supervised by a Higher Education Institute based in the UK, which the Fellow would undertake after finishing the core Fellowship programme.

Fellows can choose to take a period of six months away from work and receive a bursary of up to £15,000 while doing their programme, or continue to be attached to their place of work, with their employer being compensated for any sustained periods away.

Winning the Contract

A free online public procurement course designed to help smaller firms bid for the £220 billion of public sector contracts awarded each year has been launched.

The course, 'Winning the Contract', shows participants how to identify business opportunities to supply goods and services to the public sector, explains the public procurement process, and demonstrates how to submit tenders. It has helpful hints and tips to guide and inform businesses on the bidding process, and where to find public sector contract opportunities.

Winning the Contract is a nationally available online training course which all businesses, regardless of size and sector, can access free of charge. It is part of a

series of joint initiatives by the Office of Government Commerce and Department for Business, Innovation and Skills aimed at making the procurement market clearer and simpler.

The course, developed by Government and hosted by learndirect, takes a maximum of 3 to 4 hours and can be taken section by section as time allows.

Success stories

The People's Millions

Rother

Bexhill United Football Club £50,000
The project will enable floodlighting to be installed at the club's pitch, increasing opportunities for training and football matches. The project will upgrade the current club house facilities and improve disabled access to encourage more people to utilise the club amenities. The organisation will also establish a youth club, providing a venue for young people to meet and socialise.

Awards for All

Eastbourne

East Sussex Disability Association Limited £10,000
East Sussex Disability Association will use the award to provide specialist IT equipment to increase access to their facilities for disabled people, in particular those with visual impairment or severe back problems.

Living Life £9,991
This charity will use the award to increase its capacity to deliver education and life opportunities to disabled and disadvantaged children, and also to increase opportunities for volunteers. They will do this by purchasing new IT equipment that will allow them to offer a wider range of classes to beneficiaries. The project will also increase the opportunities for volunteers to become involved in the group.

East Sussex

East Sussex Hearing Resource Centre £5,000
The group will set up support groups for deaf and blind people, which will be used to share information about support and assistive devices. The project will also train volunteers and give them the skills necessary to be team leaders who can take the groups' work forward to other beneficiaries.

Hastings

Education Training Consortium Sussex £1,755
This community group will use the award to develop additional opportunities which include confidence building, personal development, assessing job potential, as well as assertiveness and conflict resolution. This will empower users and the wider community to engage in further learning.

The Hastings and Rother Samaritans £7,073
This group of Samaritans will upgrade their premises. This will include decorating and the installation of new ICT equipment, which will assist in volunteer training and will also be used in outreach programmes.

Lewes

Inside Out £9,663
This grant has helped to kick start activities at Inside Outside, a playgroup for the under fives, set up by two local mums who wanted to encourage more children to play outside and to use the outdoor spaces in and around their town.

Yogamonkeys Community Interest Company £8,839
This new community interest company will use the award to provide summer workshops in Lewes and Brighton for local children. Physical and creative activities will be offered such as yoga and meditation to improve health and wellbeing. The project will target less active children and those in need due to social disadvantage, disability or behavioural problems.

Wealden

Act On It £1,755
This not-for-profit company in Hailsham will use the award to host a one-day intergenerational event. Older and younger people will work together to share skills such as ballroom dancing and emailing. The project will aim to reduce prejudices towards different age groups and reduce isolation for older people.

One Village 2010 £8,750
This community group will use the award to celebrate the status of Forest Row's diverse community by providing a festival which will allow organisations to come together and provide events, encouraging the wider community to engage and respect each other.

Uckfield Town Council £4,340
The town council will use the award to pay for Action Rural Sussex to carry out a feasibility study to determine the most effective use of a community facility that the group own, for young people aged 14-25.

Grassroots Grants

Hastings

Hastings and District Interfaith Forum £2,000
The Forum will create a celebratory space twice a year (in the shape of a party) where several minority cultures can share their food and music with the rest of the community. There will be recipe sheets for the food and opportunities to work with each other in the preparation of the food. This will promote community cohesion and greater mutual understanding between the majority community and minority ethnic groups.

Hastings and Rother Rainbow Alliance £3,000
HRRA will provide training, education and promotion to enable LGBT people to fully participate in the local area as active citizens.

Wealden

April Club, Hartfield £2,000
To help towards the costs of a group holiday for 14 people at a fully accessible centre with fully accessible rooms and facilities and also personal care services.

Framfield and Blackboys Horticultural Society £5,000
To purchase a Marquee to be used every year at the summer show and to be taken to other horticultural shows. It will provide a covered hospitality area where they can display their work and an area for people to sit. This will provide shelter for both rain and the sun, particularly for the elderly and less mobile members of the community.

Hellingly Archery Club £3,150
The grant will help purchase new equipment, allowing the club to run more beginners courses and taster sessions at local events and to work with local youth groups to introduce and encourage newcomers to the sport. New equipment will also help develop expertise at various levels and in various styles of archery.

Mayfield and Five Ashes Newsletter £1,000
The funding will help the group to purchase a photocopier to produce their newsletter.

Nutley Bowling Club £1,000
Money will help build concrete retaining walls in two areas where they have sloping ground and soil slippage. This will make both areas safer and to make better and safer emergency exit from the pavilion.

Government

AGE 16 & 17 Apprentice Grant for Employers

Apprenticeship grants of £2,500 are now available to encourage employers to take on 16 and 17 year old apprentices. This grant is in addition to the costs of training, which are met by the National Apprenticeship Service (NAS).

Employers who are able to offer a job opportunity to an unemployed young person aged 16 or 17 are invited to apply for support. The NAS particularly wants to support small and medium-sized employers interested in employing an apprentice for the first time, or wishing to employ an additional apprentice over their traditional level of recruitment. It can also support larger employers where they can demonstrate that they are over-training to support smaller employers in their supply chain/the wider sector or recruiting in excess of their traditional levels of apprentice recruitment.

Payments will be administered by the NAS. Employers will receive the grants in two payments - £1,000 when the young person starts the Apprenticeship and a further £1,500 after three months. The NAS will help employers in finding a training provider to deliver the training programme and to recruit an apprentice.

Boiler Scrappage Scheme

The Government has launched a new national scheme, the Boiler Scrappage Scheme, which will help upgrade 125,000 household heating systems. Households can apply for a £400 voucher to help with the cost of replacing old, G-rated boilers for a new A-rated boiler or renewable heating system such as a biomass boiler or a heat pump.

The scheme is intended to:

- help sustain work for the 130,000 installers and over 25 UK-based boiler manufacturers throughout the economic recovery;
- save money - a household's energy bill could be cut by between £200 to £235 a year; and
- save carbon - replacing 125,000 G-rated boilers should save in the region of 140,000tCO₂ per year. This is equivalent to taking 45,000 cars off the road.

The scheme is open to householders, including tenants, and landlords who privately own and rent dwellings. To be eligible, the boiler to be scrapped must be the main boiler used to heat the home. If the householder is under 60 years of age, the boiler to be scrapped must also be in working order. However, householders of 60 and over can apply, regardless of whether the boiler is in working order.

Bright Ideas Grant

B.I.G is a £50K fund aimed at helping unlock the potential of those hundreds of small ideas and giving people the helping hand they need to prove their idea works and share it widely.

The Department of Health is looking for ideas that help ensure people's experience of care services is a good one and that they feel they are able to retain their personal dignity and self respect.

Ideas need to be submitted onto the B.I.G website <http://www.big.dh.gov.uk/> by March 18th where the general public will vote for the ones they feel are the best. Funding will be awarded to a total value of £50K to projects with the most votes at 12 noon 18th March.

Centre for Social Justice Awards

The Centre for Social Justice Awards aims to recognise and reward organisations which make an exceptional contribution towards tackling social need and effectively fighting poverty.

Awards of up to £10,000 each are available and there are no formal categories. However, in addition to the general awards, the annual Maxie Richards Award recognises excellence in tackling addiction.

The awards are open to charities, small voluntary groups, and other projects tackling poverty or social need. Organisations with or without charitable status may apply. The 2010 deadline for applications is 22 February and the award ceremony will take place in London in July. Combined Fund for Victims of Sexual Violence and Abuse

The grant scheme is open to all existing voluntary sector organisations within England and Wales that provide support to victims of sexual violence and abuse. This includes organisations supporting:

- victims of recent and historical sexual violence and abuse;
- child victims;
- particularly vulnerable groups (e.g. individuals with learning disabilities and sex workers);
- victims of female genital mutilation;
- female and/or male victims; and
- victims of sexual violence/abuse which has occurred as a result of stalking.

The aim of the Fund is to ensure the continuation of front-line services in the sexual violence sector at risk of reduction or closure. Organisations must therefore demonstrate that, due to funding difficulties, front-line services for victims of sexual violence and abuse are at risk of (a) reduction, (b) closure or (c) temporary suspension.

The total fund value available for the financial year is £2.25 million, with a maximum grant level of £50,000 set per organisation. Bids for funding in excess of this maximum grant value will be considered only when there is evidence of exceptional need.

Community Voices

This new Media Trust grant will provide a £250,000 grants programme to fund charities that run digital media projects for people from disadvantaged and isolated communities.

It will give out 26 grants worth between £1,500 and £14,000 each, as well as one grant of £61,000.

Enterprise Finance Guarantee

Capitalise Business Support has announced the launch of its new Enterprise Finance Guarantee (EFG) **loan**. This makes CBS the only Community Development Finance Institution (CDFI) in the South East and one of only a handful of lending institutions outside of the high street banks able to offer the scheme.

The credit crunch has seen a significant impact on the availability of credit and in response to this the Government launched the Enterprise Finance Guarantee scheme. It is delivered by participating Lenders and is focused upon improving the accessibility to working capital and investment funds for SMEs in the UK.

Subject to eligibility criteria being met SMEs looking for additional lending but lacking the security required by their Lender can apply.

Key features and benefits are:

- A government guarantee which partially secures business loans to any viable business with a sound borrowing proposal*
- Available for typical sums of £10,000 to £30,000**
- The loan can be repaid over any period between 3 months and 10 years
- Variable interest rates
- A quarterly premium is payable to the Government's Department for Business Innovation and Skills (BIS)
- The guarantee covers 75% of each qualifying loan and is available if the:
 - business has an annual turnover of less than £25m
 - business trades in the UK
 - business is based in Sussex, Kent or Surrey.***
 - main business activity is in a sector approved by BIS
 - the purpose of the loan meets the BIS eligibility criteria, for example:
 - expanding an existing business
 - purchase of equipment
 - working capital

FIP Family Challenge Fund

The Government has launched a second bidding round for this £2.6m programme which is aimed at supporting family intervention projects (FIPs) targeted at social housing tenants who are facing eviction or involved in anti-social behaviour or have other problems.

All bids should be submitted jointly by children's services and social housing providers (housing associations, Registered Social Landlords, Councils).

Bids are welcome from areas who did not bid in Round 1 and those who were unsuccessful or who wish to further increase project capacity. The closing date for applications is 23 February 2010. Further information:

Future Builders Fund

The £215m Futurebuilders Fund, the Government-backed loan fund set up to help third sector organisations win public service delivery contracts, has closed to new applicants after awarding all of its funds.

The chief executive of Social Investment Business, which runs the fund, said the organisation would consider reopening it when it began to receive repayments on existing loans.

Strategic Partner Programme

The Strategic Partner Programme, which is part of the Third Sector Investment Programme, aims to invest in a small number of strategic partners from April 2010-11 (for three years, subject to the availability of funds) who will work collaboratively with the Department of Health to undertake the following:

- Advise and inform the Department about key issues in the health and social care field affecting the third sector.
- Develop capability and capacity in the third sector.
- Establish a coherent and rational framework for engaging with third sector organisations at a national level in a systematic and mutually beneficial way.
- Achieve shared objectives in improving health and wellbeing and reducing health inequalities.
- Provide robust and systematic dissemination methods for information, policy developments and key programmes enabling third sector organisations to engage in the delivery of health and wellbeing objectives.

The Programme is open to voluntary organisations that meet the criteria set out in Section 64 of the Health Services and Public Health Act 1968. Eligible applicants have been extended to reach and engage with third sector organisations working in and with the following:

- Mental Health organisations.
- Women' Sector organisations.
- Carers organisations.
- Armed Forces and Veterans Charities.
- Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual and Transgender organisations.
- Offender Health and Social Care organisations.

Only one application will be successful under each of these areas. In total, a maximum of six additional Strategic Partners will be successful in 2010/11.

Ecominds Small Grants

Due to the large number of applications received to date, Ecominds has brought forward the closing date for applications to its Small Grants programme.

Ecominds aims to help people with direct experience of mental distress to become involved in environmental projects that improve mental and physical health and local communities.

The programme is open to community groups, voluntary organisations, schools, community interest companies and social enterprises in England. Small Grants of up to £20,000 are available for both capital and revenue costs.

Projects must meet at least one of the following three themes:

- Improve local environments, open spaces and the countryside, whilst making them more accessible and relevant to people's needs.
- Create a greater sense of community ownership of the local environment, with better collaboration between communities and the voluntary and statutory sectors.
- Improve social, economic and environmental sustainability.

The Reaching Communities programme is not closing at the end of March 2010.

Here is an update on the recently introduced Fast Track Review:

An additional £50m has been allocated to Reaching Communities, this will be split between the review of unsuccessful applications and the five Committee Meetings that remain during this financial year.

Only projects that met the quality threshold (Good/Good or above) but were unsuccessful in receiving funding and were considered by the Committee between April and October 2009 will be asked if they would like to be reconsidered.

Groups who previously received reject reason insufficient funds will be contacted by the Operations team, and invited to fill in a fast track review form. In addition to this - any project that had previously applied to the Reaching Communities programme will now be able to re-apply again as BIG has dropped the 12 month rule that was introduced when demand for the programme was at its height. Organisations coming back (rejected on grounds other than insufficient funds) can reapply to RC through the normal application process.

In future any project that is unsuccessful in applying for funding to the Reaching Communities programme will be given specific reasons on why they were unsuccessful. They will also receive detailed feedback on their application and given guidance on the areas that could be strengthened before re-applying to the programme.

The Big Lottery Fund's England Committee will meet to discuss all of the projects that want to be reconsidered and are eligible for this review. We expect most applicants will be informed of the Committee's decision in February 2010.

What if the project has changed? As part of this review, they can only consider projects that are the same as that described in the original application and assessment process. They can allow some minor amendments to project outcomes and milestones and the project budget but that will be all. Please see the information sheet.

BIG Lottery feel it will be important to manage expectations, because of course it will still not be possible to fund every project. However, it is a great opportunity for those projects that missed out first time around to have another chance at receiving funding, and the Committee felt that this was the fairest way to distribute the additional funds available and give organisations that met our requirements a second opportunity to apply for funding.

Victims of Sexual Violence

Two new funding streams have been created by merging existing government programmes; they both aim to support voluntary organisations on supporting victims of sexual violence.

- Independent Sexual Violence Advisors (ISVAs) – This funding is available to pay for ISVAs who support victims of sexual violence by helping them to access services and supporting them as their cases progress through the criminal justice system.
- Services for Victims of Sexual Violence and Abuse – This £2.25m fund supports voluntary sector organisations that provide support to victims of sexual violence and abuse. It is aimed primarily at front-line services at risk of reduction or closure.

The deadline for applications to both funding streams is the 22 February 2010.

Trusts and Foundations

AHF – Grants for Building Preservation Trusts

The Architectural Heritage Fund (AHF) was established to encourage and support the work of organisations dedicated to the preservation and renewal of buildings of architectural and historic significance in the UK.

It provides financial assistance for the following:

- Project Development Grants - funding for building preservation trusts to help them with the costs and expenses of developing a project once its viability has been established, and take it towards the point at which work starts on site.

European Youth Foundation

Each year the EYF allocates about €3 million to non-governmental organisations that directly assist young people ages 15 to 30, supporting some 300 projects involving more than 15,000 young people.

Its purpose is to encourage co-operation among young people in Europe by providing financial support to such European youth activities which serve the promotion of peace, understanding and co-operation in a spirit of respect for the Council of Europe's fundamental values such as human rights, democracy, tolerance and solidarity.

Eligible to apply are international non-governmental youth organisations or networks; national or local non-governmental youth organisations or networks; and non-governmental structures involved in youth work.

Deadlines for 2010 have been announced as: 1 April for Category A (international youth meetings) and B projects (youth activity other than a meeting) (Category C projects - annual administrative costs - had a 1st February deadline). There are no fixed deadlines for pilot project applications (Category D) or first (ad hoc) applications. However, they should be submitted online at least three months prior to the beginning of the activity.
